



DEFINING OUR COMMUNITY

With over 9 million residents and about 95,000 births, Los Angeles County has the largest population of any county in the nation. Spanning 4,300 square miles, it is divided into eight geographic regions, known as Service Planning Areas (SPAs).

Family Strengthening Network

The Family Strengthening Network formed in 2013 and includes all the organizations and hospitals in L.A. County that provide free home visiting services using either the Welcome Baby, Healthy Families America, or Parents as Teachers models. With some 500 home visiting program staff at 12 hospitals and over two dozen community-based organizations, this is the largest home visiting network in the nation.

From 2020-2024, the network served over 70,000 families and completed over 250,000 visits.

LABBN provides the training, database and communications infrastructure, and administrative support to help these organizations serve families and change lives.

Beyond our network ...

In addition to training our network's home visiting program staff, LABBN has hosted and led trainings for various L.A. County partners, including: the Department of Public Health's Nurse-Family Partnership and its African American Infant and Maternal Mortality (AAIMM) Doula Program, the Department of Children and Family Services, Juvenile Probation, LAUSD, and MAMAs Neighborhood.



Before home visitors see families, LABBN makes sure they have in-depth training on a wide range of topics. We coordinate and facilitate this training throughout the year, and then follow up by offering continuing education, peer-to-peer learning, and collaborative meetings.

LABBN's trainings emphasize trauma-informed and healing-centered approaches. New staff receive up to 200 hours of initial training on topics that include: prenatal/postpartum care, infant development, family planning, positive parenting, and screenings/assessments. The result: high-quality perinatal care and social support for families.

In the last couple years, we've added new training sessions on engaging fathers in home visits, preventing compassion fatigue, and helping families and providers cope with grief and loss.

SUPPORTING ONGOING IMPROVEMENT THROUGH TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE



LABBN's oversight and support helps Welcome Baby, Healthy Families America, and Parents as Teachers programs meet requirements set by their funders and national program models. In 2020-2024, we did this by:

- Conducting annual program audits for each First 5 LA-funded Welcome Baby program to measure program fidelity, highlight successes, and explore areas of improvement
- Producing and maintaining protocols for the First 5 LA-funded WB, HFA, and PAT programs
 - 40 programmatic protocols completed and updated annually based on feedback from staff and funders
- Hosting six monthly, 2-hour confidential reflective practice coaching groups that provide WB, HFA, and PAT leaders with tools and resources to host effective weekly group and individual reflective supervision sessions for their home visiting staff
- Developing program assessment tools, including client satisfaction surveys for the WB programs
- Hosting regular professional development meetings for each role to help them continually improve their service to families. These include monthly meetings for WB, HFA, and PAT program managers.
- Hosting bi-weekly Family Strengthening Oversight Entity (FSOE) calls, where First 5 LA, LABBN, and Work2Live discuss developments affecting the network and how to promote more effective service.
- Hosting oversight retreats to align us in the work.

Reflective Practice Builds Resilience and Buffers Against Workplace Stress

Staff in our network often see trauma — acute, chronic, systemic — as they support and advocate for the most vulnerable in our community. To buffer against workplace stress, staff receive individual and group reflective supervision.

LABBN conducts bi-annual confidential surveys to assess the quality of the reflective supervision they receive. Over 94% of staff usually report feeling safe, nurtured and supported during these sessions.

REFLECTIVE PRACTICE AND SUPERVISION

Over the past year, I've worked with LABBN to envision and commence activities that center and celebrate the voices and wisdom of persons with direct experience providing reflective supervision in HFA, PAT, and WB home visiting programs. This has included coordinating and providing mentorship to BIPOC co-facilitators — with current or past experience as supervisors in HFA, PAT, or WB — to lead LABBN cohort trainings in Reflective Practice and Supervision. This is an invaluable opportunity for newly onboarded home visiting staff to learn directly from those with wisdom and experience delivering and supervising LABBN-supported programs.

CREATING DATABASE INFRASTRUCTURE TO IMPROVE OUTCOMES



LABBN maintains a vast database that organizations in the Family Strengthening Network use to track activity and outcomes. By providing comprehensive training and technical support, LABBN also helps its partners fulfill requirements for data collection and confidentiality. We also bring data to life with rigorous analysis and reporting, so it can guide our network's relentless pursuit of continuous quality improvement.

Along with First 5 LA and County agencies, LABBN has worked to standardize how home visiting programs collect data. LABBN also helps programs create their own reports, along with providing support for their overall database operations.

LABBN is excited to be leading a project that will consolidate and synthesize home visiting data from a variety of sources so that we can look more broadly and deeply at services across our county. This Home Visiting Data Lake will help us see beyond the activities of Welcome Baby, Healthy Families America, and Parents as Teachers in L.A. County. (See box above.)

Data Lake Project -

LABBN, First 5 CA, First 5 LA, and other partners in Los Angeles County are working to build a repository of home visiting data across funding streams, multiple databases, and program models. The goal: to facilitate the compiling and analysis of data that will inform countywide planning efforts and show the collective impact of home visiting.



This data lake will also improve our ability to develop targeted strategies to reach underserved populations, identify service gaps, and engage more families.

The project is expected to be completed by June 2025.

COMMUNICATIONS



LABBN works to raise awareness about home visiting, and supports organizations and hospitals with outreach and recruitment. We create custom marketing materials, blogs, social media, and websites to facilitate referrals. We also produce the Welcome Baby book and maintain an online library of resources for parents.



The Welcome Baby Book

helps program participants learn about pregnancy, postpartum, and parenthood. LABBN updates the book and makes it available online in English and Spanish for anyone: <u>LABestBabies.org/Book</u> and <u>LABestBabies.org/Libro</u>

The Parenting Resource Library

is an online collection of up-to-date handouts and guides that supplement the Welcome Baby book. Also available in Spanish, it aligns with the book's chapters: *LABestBabies.org/Parenting* and *LABestBabies.org/Familias*

The L.A. County Home Visiting eDirectory

is an online tool that LABBN created to help connect families to local home visiting programs. Available in multiple languages, it asks families (or providers making referrals) a few questions, and then shows which programs are available in their area. The eDirectory includes over 50 community organizations and hospitals that provide home visiting or doula services. LABBN continually updates the eDirectory, and works with partners to help them use it to make referrals. <u>eDirectory.HomeVisitingLA.org</u>



The Communications team gave a presentation on the eDirectory at the Zero to Three LEARN early childhood conference in Long Beach on August 1, 2024. LABBN facilitates monthly meetings for Welcome Baby outreach teams to connect with each other and discuss successes and challenges in enrolling families. We also hold quarterly webinars on topics related to their role.

LABBN launched this site during the pandemic when in-person outreach shifted to virtual. The website explains the Welcome Baby program, and features testimonials from clients and a section for providers to make referrals.



SUPPORTING PARTNERS **TO SUPPORT FAMILIES**

LABBN delivers! As part of the Welcome Baby program, families receive items like breastfeeding pillows, picture books, cabinet latches, outlet protectors, developmental toys, and healthcare kits (toothbrush, nasal aspirator, medicine dropper, thermometer, alcohol wipes). We maintain an online ordering system where our partners request these items.

We also help our partners connect families to basic necessities. During the pandemic. LABBN worked with First 5 LA and others to distribute one million diapers in L.A. County. To help home visitors learn about various opportunities for clients, we send weekly emails listing upcoming events and post these on the Stronger Families Blog.



Making Connections With Families

When virtual visits replaced in-person meetings, our partners said many families did not have reliable access to technology and the Internet, so we decided to help. In April 2021, we distributed technology bundles, including a Chromebook and wi-fi hotspot, to 200 families in L.A. County.

During the pandemic, sites held drivethrough distributions, food pantries, and other events to help meet families' needs. Some of these events continue to be held regularly.

ANNUAL SUMMIT: HONORING AND UPLIFTING HOME VISITING CHAMPIONS

For the last decade, LABBN has organized an annual summit to highlight and celebrate Family Strengthening Network staff and programs across the county.

At the event, we hear from parents whose lives have been changed by this work, and from LABBN's data analysts, who present numbers that prove the impact. Keynote speakers like Shola Richards (2022) and Dr. Sade Burrell (2024) have joined us at these events to inspire and honor the staff for the lifechanging work they do daily. LABBN also delivers a gift package to each of the over 500 staff members who attend.

Each year, a theme for the event helps shape the agenda. These are the themes for the event since 2021:

- 2021: #HomeVisitingWorks: Honoring the Changemakers
- 2022: Standing Strong With Families in L.A. County
- 2023: Creating Connections: Building an Inclusive Home Visiting Village
- 2024: Rising Up to Meet the Moment: Honoring Progress, Shaping Tomorrow



At the 2024 summit, Whitney Hammock, a former client of the Healthy Families America program at South Los Angeles Health Projects, shared how home visiting helped her and her kids — and how it led to a new job helping other families.

LABBN organized a service award ceremony a few weeks before this year's summit to recognize home visiting staff who have been part of the network for a decade or more. Hosted at First 5 LA on May 21, 2024, the event honored more than 90 dedicated people from all over L.A. County.

Starting with one Welcome Baby program in 2009 — a partnership with California Hospital and <u>Maternal and Child Health Access</u> — our network now includes a dozen Welcome Baby programs and over two dozen HFA and PAT home visiting programs at community-based organizations.

COMING TOGETHER TO IMPROVE AND ADVANCE HOME VISITING

The Consortium -

Managed by LABBN, the Los Angeles County Perinatal and Early Childhood Home Visitation Consortium brings together early childhood home visiting programs, family and child health organizations, advocacy groups, and other stakeholders. In all, the Consortium is made up of over 60 organizations across Los Angeles County. Their collective goal: strengthening community resources, promoting systemic change, and ensuring equitable access to services for diverse populations.

Consortium Workgroups

The Consortium includes six workgroups that collaborate to enhance home visiting services and support for families. Each workgroup focuses on a specific area. Through regular meetings and collaboration, these workgroups help L.A. County's home visiting programs be as good as they can be.

ADVOCACY WORKGROUP

Goal: Empower and coordinate the Consortium membership to change systems through narrative shifts, policies, funding, and services that center families.

Recent highlights:

- Created home visiting talking points members can use when connecting with policymakers and health audiences
- Launched an Advocacy Toolkit for communitybased organizations to use
- Signed on to 37 letters of support for bills affecting families and children 0-5



AFRICAN AMERICAN HOME VISITING

Goal: Develop tools, strategies, and resources that raise consciousness, build trust, and change practices within home visiting agencies that foster the recruitment and retention of more African American home visiting staff and increase enrollment of African American families.

Recent highlights:

- Added as a Consortium workgroup in 2020.
- Produced a best practices hiring and retention guide in an effort to increase the number of African American home visiting staff in L.A. County. The guide has been piloted at two home visiting agencies.
- Worked to strengthen the relationship between L.A. County's doula programs and home visiting programs by hosting an informational Doula 101 webinar. Eighty-three people attended the live session.
- Launched Home Visiting Day in L.A. County in 2022. The day raises awareness of home visiting and celebrates staff and families. (See page 13.)

BEST PRACTICES

Goal: Partner with families and providers to elevate the quality of home visiting and integrate racial equity.

Recent highlights:

- Hosted webinars for home visiting staff, including one about the support services available through L.A. County's regional centers and others on Medi-Cal coverage, domestic violence red flags, and immigrant rights. Over 150 people attended each webinar.
- Developed a Parent Voice subgroup to elevate the voices of home visiting participants in improving the quality of services.



DATA WORKGROUP

Goal: Serve as a community of practice that uses home visiting data to develop practices that track outcomes, monitor disparities, and reveal gaps.

Recent highlights:

- Published updated <u>infographic</u> about home visiting programs' capacity and the needs of L.A. County families.
- Collected new data on descriptive and outcome indicators — including breastfeeding rates, depression and anxiety screenings, prenatal and postpartum care, and well-child visits — from home visiting programs implementing at least one of seven home visiting models. Published a comprehensive report detailing this information.
- Laid groundwork for the data lake project.

REFERRALS WORKGROUP

Goal: Build and strengthen pathways and linkages to home visiting services and other community resources for L.A. County families, while advocating for systemic improvements to home visiting programs' eligibility and access.

Recent highlights:

- In 2024, hosted a virtual housing panel where four L.A. County housing agencies provided 150 home visiting staff and early childhood educators with resources to help address housing instability for their clients. Attendees were from all over L.A. County.
- Hosted two virtual focus groups with 22 home visitors to understand how they overcome barriers when connecting families with community services.



FATHER ENGAGEMENT WORKGROUP

Goal: Develop and promote practices, and policies, that intentionally support fathers' engagement in home visiting.

Recent highlights:

- Became a Consortium workgroup in 2021.
- Coordinated an event for home visiting staff focusing on the importance of father involvement in home visits in June of 2023.

DADS MATTER TOO: STRENGTHENING THE VILLAGE OF HOME VISITING SUPPORT FOR FATHERS

The Consortium coordinates various events to support home visiting staff members' professional and personal development. On June 13, 2024, at the California Endowment, the Consortium hosted an event to promote father engagement in home visiting.

Topics included:

- Male/father bias as a barrier in getting dads to participate in home visiting
- The importance of culture/tradition in home visiting as it pertains to father inclusion, and what cultural barriers currently exist
- Strategies to include and engage nonresidential fathers in home visits
- Strategies to include fathers when a family is dealing with domestic violence, substance use disorders, or mental health problems
- The extent to which home visiting program policies and protocols invite and encourage father participation



HOME VISITING DAY

Home Visiting Day is an annual event highlighting the importance of free, voluntary in-home support services for pregnant people and families with young children. A project of the Consortium, the day highlights the benefits that children and families receive from home visiting programs. It also recognizes and celebrates the work of our county's dedicated home visitors.
